Parish Council Precept

The Parish Council is financed by the 'precept'. It is a 'national' local tax that only applies to a specific authority area, for example Stanwick. It is collected by North Northants Council with the other local taxes due, such as council tax, Police Fire & Crime levy.

The precept is collected according to the 'banding' of council tax on properties between April and January in 10 monthly instalments.

Each year the Parish Council looks at its financial position and sets a budget for the coming year before working out how much the precept as a total figure should be. This generally happens at the November meeting.

During the financial year, 2022 to 2023, the Parish Council has incurred significant one off costs including repairs to the church boundary wall (£12,100.00). The decision was made to increase the precept for 2023-24 to help make up for this expenditure.

The Parish Council has made the decision to increase the total amount of precept for the coming financial year 2024/5. We know that everything is costing more and this will increase our maintenance costs and repair bills. We know that we are likely to have significant repair bills for the church path. We need to set money aside for future repairs costs. We have renegotiated one of our largest expenditures, grounds maintenance, to bring down costs.

On paper, the total percentage increase of the precepts looks very large, but in reality taken as an average across all households, it equals approximately 53 pence per house per month extra.

Any person having difficulty with making their council tax payments should speak to North Northants Council as the Parish Council is not involved in collecting the money due.

What has the Parish Council been up to in 2023?

The Parish Council operates on a 'civic year' basis. This runs from May to April.

In May 2023, Councillor Mark Taylor was elected as Chairman for the year. Councillor Sue Kitchener was elected as the vice chair.

What we have been doing:

- Dealings with the Diocese has taken up a lot of time, trying to find a repair solution for the main path that is acceptable to the Diocese and affordable for tax payers
- Traffic consultations in response to concerns raised by residents about parking at certain locations. This has led to a request for double yellow line parking restrictions being submitted for High Street and Samuels Close/West Street.
- Independent grounds maintenance contract. The Council has tendered for and awarded a grounds maintenance contract that will be cheaper to administer than the present contract.
- Environmental enhancements of the cemetery including planting of tree whips to form new hedging and spring plants
- Supporting community groups through grants and sponsorship
- Supporting the Bowls Club by endorsing a grant application
- Established a new events committee that includes representative of village groups at its meetings
- Developed the 'what's on' web diary page
- Opted into a scheme to have 20mph advisory boards
- Took part in a celebratory match at Stanwick Bowls Club to mark their centenary
- Gave a reading at Nine Lessons & Carols service in December
- Co-ordinated the Christmas Fayre 2023
- Made a £500.00 contribution to the new Raunds Skate Park that our residents will be able to use too

What are we frustrated about not being able to move forward:

- We are still waiting on 'Welcome to Stanwick' signs for Chelveston Road and Higham Road to help give Stanwick a sense of place
- Installing bollards on the junction of High St & Church St to make the area safer for pedestrians
- Repairs to the church path so that we can unlock the gate

Dog fouling - it shouldn't be a problem....

But it is

As a dog owner, you know you are required to have your dog under control at all times. If they are off the lead, this means they should respond immediately to commands. You are also required to pick up after your dog – wherever it does its business.

Dog mess is the most unacceptable and offensive type of litter on our streets, at the recreation ground and our public areas

While most dog owners are caring, responsible individuals, there are still some people who do not clean up after their pets.

Anyone who fails to clear up after their dog can be issued with a Fixed Penalty Notice of up to £100. If the case goes to court this could cost the owner or person in charge of the animal up to £1,000.

The law states that being unaware a dog has fouled or not having a suitable bag **is not a reasonable excuse.**

Any public bin can take the waste

Dog fouling is not only deeply unpleasant, it is dangerous. Whilst rare, contact with dog excrement can cause toxocariasis – a nasty infection that can lead to dizziness, nausea, asthma and even blindness or seizures.

Reporting those people who do not clear up their dog

North Northants Council are the body responsible for dealing with the problem. Use their website to make a report www.northnorthants.gov.uk/dogs/dog-fouling or call the contact centre on 0300 126 3000

If you witness someone letting their dog foul without cleaning it up afterwards, you should report it. Please note the:

- dates and times
- frequency it happens
- description of the dog
- details of the offender

You can also let them know if there are ongoing issues with dog fouling in our area. They may be able to put up warning signs or monitor the area more.

If it isn't picked up, they can issue a fine and they take offenders to court.



Vandalism

ALL incidents of vandalism or anti-social behaviour should be reported to the Police (even if you think nothing will come of it in your case).

The Police deploy their officers according to the information they have. The more reports of incidents, the more coverage Stanwick will receive.

Graffiti

If your property has been graffitied, you should make your own report to the Police.

Reporting online is easiest (although they ask a lot of personal questions) or call the non-emergency number 101.

If you think you know who is responsible, you can tell Crime Stoppers UK anonymously

DO NOT confront any individuals you may think are responsible.

REPORT any anti-social behaviour you witness to the Police.

TELL the Parish Council dates, times & locations of groups hanging around. This information will be passed on so that the Police can build a picture and target their presence in Stanwick.

999 This is not however an exhaustive list and common sense must prevail.

- danger to life
- use, or immediate threat of use, of violence
- Serious injury to a person and/or
- serious damage to property
- the crime is, or likely to be serious and in progress
- an offender has just been disturbed at the scene
- an offender has been detained and poses, or is likely to pose, a risk to other people
- Road traffic accident where:
 - involves, or is likely to involve, serious personal injury
 - the road is blocked or there is a dangerous or excessive build-up of traffic.

Stanwick Community Garden, which is completely run by volunteers, has evolved into a multi-use garden with excellent facilities which are suitable to as wide a range of individuals and groups as possible. We have raised beds which are used by the local school and nurseries for their gardening clubs, mini plots for individuals to grow their own fruit, vegetables or flowers and the rest of the garden for simple enjoyment by anyone who wishes to pay us a visit. We have seating where you can just sit and enjoy the view! The gate is always unlocked - just kept closed at all times to keep out the rabbits - which is especially important as we are neighbours to the allotments and the feast they might enjoy in there....!

Next to the garden is the 'Social Area' which has a wooden playground Tractor for small children to play on, and picnic benches for when it's time to refuel!

We hold an annual plant sale and also participate in other village events to support the community and promote the use of the garden.

During the better weather we start to hold 'work parties' where we ask for assistance with maintaining the garden and for volunteers to come along and muck in. We will start these again in the spring and they are usually on a Saturday morning between 10-12 and tend to have a half-time cuppa and biscuit natter break!

Operation Snap

Operation Snap has been set up to keep our county's roads as safe as possible

It allows members of the public to report driving offences in the Northamptonshire by filling in a form and uploading video evidence they have captured.

Submitted footage and reports are then examined by roads policing officers and can be used to take actions against drivers breaking the law.

Floral and other tributes at Stanwick Cemetery

As a parish we are trying to reduce our impact on the environment and reduce pollution.

Did you know that traditional florist foam can take thousands of years to degrade down to its natural elements?

You may recall that people laying tributes to Her Majesty were asked to remove the plastic wrappers on flowers.

True cellophane, made of plant materials and other materials, can degrade within a matter of months.

Synthetic cellophane will take a few decades but traditional plastic can take 1,000 years to degrade in a landfill. Unfortunately, the plastics don't break down completely but instead photo-degrade, becoming microplastics that absorb toxins and continue to pollute the environment.

We therefore respectfully ask you to, when possible, think about the tributes you bring into the cemetery and what they are made of, so that only truly lasting things that you leave are your thoughts and memories.

The Herbert Protocol – Safe and Found

The initiative is named after George Herbert, a war veteran of the Normandy Landings, who lived with dementia. He died whilst 'missing', trying to find his childhood home.

Caring for vulnerable people, including those with dementia or Alzheimer's, can be challenging. There is a risk they can go 'walkabout'.

The protocol is a form of essential information that can be quickly handed to the Police if a person goes missing, saving valuable time in a crisis situation.

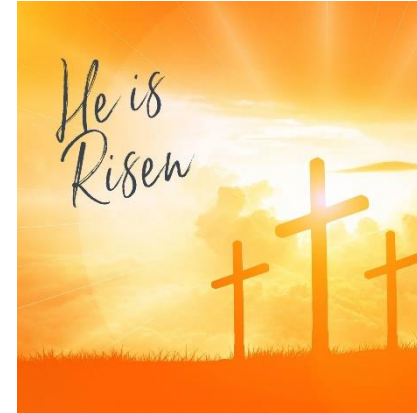
